OPEN AND ACTIVE

The Bishop's Pastoral Letter for August 2019 Bishop Geoff challenges us: ARE WE FIT FOR PURPOSE?

In my last Pastoral Letter in April, I expressed the hope that Brexit would have gone smoothly and everything would be wonderful!

Things have not gone as many hoped and frankly you do not need me to tell you what a mess our Nation seems to be grappling with. Please continue to pray for all our MPs and especially whoever happens to be Prime Minister by the time you read this. Pray too for the healing of divisions within our (far from) United Kingdom, between young and old and between friends and within families (including the Family of the Church). Prayer works where so much else fails.

Someone once wrote that 'Society at its worst needs the Church at its best' and while so much attention is necessarily focused on our relationship with Europe and post Brexit trade, there is a real need for us as the Church to keep reminding those who are elected to govern this country that there are also many pressing domestic issues that need their attention – housing; education; health and well-being; effects of climate change; challenges facing our agricultural sector and rural communities etc etc – I am sure you can add to the list!

I firmly believe that we have to offer a voice to the voice-less and through our daily living out of our faith come alongside those who are struggling in the cities, towns and villages of our Diocese of Lichfield.

Our 'mandate' comes not from the electorate but from Jesus Christ – his own example and his command that we should care for one another expressed so directly in Matthew 25:31ff. We have to ask ourselves if we are a 'sheep' or a 'goat' – we know what we should be doing and we have enough Saints to remind us that through the Grace of God and with the guidance of the Holy

Spirit our Lord's will can be done. But we also have to ask ourselves the hard question: 'Are **we** fit for purpose?' The Prayer of Intercession in the Book of Common Prayer Communion Service urges us to 'pray for the whole state of Christ's Church militant here in earth'. The 'militant' Church is the visible earthly Church as opposed to the Church 'triumphant' that is invisible in Heaven. On earth the Church is militant in that it daily battles with the powers of darkness – in Heaven it is triumphant because it has overcome those powers of darkness.

We are the Christian Church on earth and we must be prepared to make our concern for all people visible by our militancy. There is no point 'talking the talk' unless we are prepared to 'walk the walk'! There are so many good examples within our Diocese where this is already happening and through its social concern the Church is militant. But there is so much more that we could be doing to serve our local Communities. I have always thought that the House of Bread in Stafford offers an amazing template for what more of us could be doing. The doors are open to all and the welcome is truly inclusive and hospitable. Refreshments are readily available but more importantly people are there to listen and to talk with one another in a friendly and nonjudgmental manner. Prayer and Bible study are offered in an unfussy way alongside practical help with people's immediate needs (usually about finding somewhere to sleep) and there is a willingness to come alongside people and help them in their dealings with the various authorities.

It is no wonder that The House of Bread has been honoured with The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service but itself is honouring God through the ministry that it is offering. If your Church is at present closed for most of the week how about asking what you might be able to do to make it more militant in your own community – and bring your Church and your own faith alive!

How did your churchyard grow?

Since the 1940s over 97% of flower-rich grassland, that was once widespread in the countryside, has vanished. The beautiful ancient grassland found in a churchyard is a relic of that once common meadow and the community of meadow plants, fungi and creatures is very special.

By August any areas of grass that were left to flower in the summer should have been cut and raked off. Since the flowers we are looking to encourage are perennials, we do not need to wait until they all set seed and the grassland should be cut whilst still green and vigorous. If left uncut for too long the grass dies back which looks unsightly and also allows nutrients to go into the roots, increasing fertility and encouraging lush grass growth next year (at the expense of more delicate flowers and finer grasses). Wildflowers thrive in low fertility soil so removing nutrient-rich cuttings is vital.

A good trick to reduce grass growth is to introduce the wildflower Yellow Rattle which is partly parasitic, drawing nutrients from grasses. This is the time of year to purchase seed which needs to be sown before the winter. Please have a look at 'News and Blog' on our website for more information about Yellow Rattle. This wildflower will assist you in managing for wildflowers, looks pretty and may also save you cutting costs!

The Bishop's Pastoral Letter for September 2019 THREE WORDS TO PUT OUR HOUSE IN ORDER

Where were you at 21.17 (British Summer Time) on 20th July 1969? Like almost everybody my age or even older, I was glued to a television set, watching very blurry images of Apollo 11's lunar module touch down on the moon – followed a few hours later by the first human moon walk.

And where was I at 21.17 on 20th July this year? I was in Lichfield Cathedral, for a celebration of the Eucharist beginning exactly 50 years to the day, hour and minute after that momentous event. We used Eucharistic Prayer C from the American Book of Common Prayer: At your command all things came to be: the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and this fragile earth, our island home. Those words, written ten years after the moon landing, express powerfully both the vastly enlarged horizons which space exploration has opened to us, and at the same time the focus it shines on our own small planet, *'our island home'*. Viewed from beyond, our earth looks both very beautiful and very vulnerable.

The recognition that together we need to care for this home of ours is an ancient one, as can see from three related 'eco' words, all of them from the Greek oikos, 'a house'. First is eco-nomics, literally the way in which a household is to be ordered. In Christian tradition, the 'Divine Economy' means in the first place the Incarnation, the coming among us of God as the man Jesus of Nazareth to recast and renew our relations with one another. In everyday terms, that momentous event of economy means that we have to look for right dealings, fairness and justice among us, and a sustainable use of our resources.

Then there is the word ecu-menical. In its deepest sense, this is not just about relations between different denominations of the church; it refers to all who dwell within our own home – that is, all the citizens of earth. The future of our planet belongs to us all, and it can only be saved by all of us together: as members of a worldwide communion, we Christians should of all people know


that being part of a wider belonging is the only way to bring change in our divided world.

And third, of course, there is eco-logy. We have come to see, as never before, how fragile our world is, how precarious its survival, how great the responsibility laid on us to care for this, the home God has given into our stewardship. On 20th September this month, led by young people around the world, there will be a great day of mobilisation of Christians, people of other faiths, and all of good will to raise awareness of the challenges facing us, and the urgency of collective action to change our collective behaviour.

Bishop Clive writes in Spotlight about some of the practical ways in which we can join together on 20th September, and as we do that we need to hold to the big picture. Ecological mobilisation, ecumenical partnership and economic justice go together as we commit to the future of 'this fragile earth, our island home', which God loved so much that he gave his only Son for its life.

Ivy, friend or foe?

Ivy comes into flower in early autumn and will be literally buzzing with bees. This late supply of nectar is a boon for species preparing for winter, while ivy berries provide a welcome winter food source. Dense ivy provides a great place for birds, mammals and invertebrates such as spiders and insects to shelter in bad weather. The Holly Blue butterfly has two caterpillar food plants, holly in spring and ivy at this time of year. No wonder this is the iconic churchyard butterfly! Ivy protects stonework, reducing erosion by weather and air pollution, whilst an ivy-covered wall may be being held up by it. So, think twice before waging war on ivy.

BUT...ivy can smother the slow-growing yew, constricting trunk and branches and competing for light. Lichens need sunny conditions and die beneath dense ivy. It pushes apart stones in complex monuments like chest tombs or crosses and within walls. So, ivy can be destructive as well as an asset.

I've concluded that there's a place for ivy but also places where it should be controlled or even removed. Always strip ivy from yews but leave it on other trees. If ivy is covering monuments, leave it unless you are recording or restoring them, but try and stop it growing over other stonework. Leave ivy on walls but try and clip it in late winter to stop it spreading further. If in doubt, please contact Caring for God's Acre for advice.

The Poet - George Heath and garden flowers; The Shell Seekers; Romeo and Juliet; The Secret Garden



AN UPDATE FROM PETER DAVIES....



Dear Friends

During July we honoured 59 vouchers (45 in June and 34 in April) which helped 79 Adults and 54 children, (June - 58 adults and 38 children; April - 49 adults and 21 children).

Sadly our stock has dwindled. It should be a matter of serious concern for us all and we need to respond with our giving, prayers and in making known this situation as widely as possible.

We received 1232 kg. The greater part of this is a decline in donations through supermarkets. If this should continue then we will need to look to other ways of increasing our stock levels. We have distributed 1553 kg. These figures don't give the complete picture but they should increase our efforts to ensure that there will always be sufficient to meet the needs of those who through no fault of their own find themselves in such hardship.

Our website is updated regularly with our needs.

Thank you for all the help and support you have given during the time I have been Project Co-ordinator. The Trustees are currently advertising for a new co-ordinator and will hopefully appoint someone during September.

In the meantime, Ian Smith, the assistant Project Coordinator is 'caretaking', and will be happy to deal with any issues that you may have. Please pray for him during this time especially as there are the challenges of a quality assurance visit from the Trussell trust and a stock take during August.
