The Bishop's Pastoral Letter for October 2019

Not just once upon a time



I recently enjoyed a wonderful evening at Lichfield Cathedral, listening to Simon Johnson, the Organist and Assistant Director of Music at St Paul's Cathedral, London, and members of the Lichfield Cathedral Choir and Chamber Choir presenting The Planets by Gustav Holst accompanied by amazing on-screen images from NASA's Goddard Space Flight Centre. This was part of the Cathedral's excellent series of events to mark the 50th

anniversary of the first landing by a human being on the moon: 'Journeys through Space and Time'.

I will not forget the wonder of listening to 'Neptune, the Mystic' whilst watching images of cloud formations on the planet itself and being overwhelmed by the beauty of God's creation.

The Psalmist tells us...

'The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands... Their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the end of the world.'

Our Creator God made all of this and he also made each one of us as a unique expression of his love. God calls us to care for his creation, to be good stewards. As Archbishop Desmond Tutu has said:

"The future of our fragile, beautiful planet home is in our hands. As God's family, we are stewards of God's creation. We can be wantonly irresponsible, or we can be caring and compassionate. God says, "I have set before you life and death... choose life."

In April of this year, a 16 year old young woman from Sweden, Greta Thunberg, addressed MPs in the Houses of Parliament.

Her message was clear and powerful:

"We are living with a climate emergency. Sometimes we just simply have to find a way. The moment we decide to fulfill something, we can do anything. And I'm sure that the moment we start behaving as if we were in an emergency, we can avoid climate and ecological catastrophe. Humans are very adaptable: we can still fix this. But the opportunity to do so will not last for long. We must start today. We have no more excuses."

In the last week of September, people around the world took part in action to coincide with the United Nations Climate Summit, including many churches, schools, chaplaincies and fresh expressions in this diocese.

We can all be a part of restoring God's creation, we can all make a difference but it requires our ongoing commitment – we're not finished in a week! In my office we are taking further steps to become more environmentally friendly, stopping any use of 'single use' plastics and items that are not environmentally friendly, ensuring that we cut down on the amount of paper we use and that all documents are printed double-sided, reducing, re-using and recycling.

Ballerina, blushing, parrot, spangle, goblet!



What do these all have in common? If you're ever asked this in a quiz, then the answer is that these are all names

of waxcaps! Waxcaps are our most distinctive grassland fungi, found in places which have not been ploughed, reseeded or sprayed. Churchyards are a real haven for them. Small, shiny, often brightly coloured and mushroom-shaped, they appear like scattered jewels thrown across the grass.

Before the development of the microscope in the 18th century, fungi were a puzzle, appearing overnight and sometimes taken to be the work of 'dark powers'. Actually, the visible part of the fungus is the 'fruit', filled with spores. The rest of the fungus is below ground and consists of hair-like filaments called *hyphae* which develop into a mesh or *mycelium*, growing through the material from which they take their food. There is still much for ecologists to learn about the complex relationship between grassland plants and trees and the fungi associated with them, but it is clear that they are a vital component.

If you are managing your churchyard grassland for wildflowers, then you will be helping the grassland fungi too. Waxcaps need short grass in autumn but both lawn and meadow areas will be cut short by now, so they can appear in either. Try not to mow them; allowing time for spores to be released and remember the golden rule: always rake and remove your grass cuttings, regardless of the grass length.

Leek Deanery Synod

held at St Matthew's Church, Meerbrook on 23rd July 2019

Rev Brian Statham expressed the joy of visiting village churches for the summer meetings of Leek Deanery Synod and led us in a reading from 1 Corinthians 1: 26 – 30 and prayed for the churches of the Deanery and all the people there, especially at St Matthew's. He prayed that we will be signs and symbols of God's presence to the community. We prayed for our speaker Rev Frances Wilson and all her work encompasses. She apologised for leaving her computer at home inadvertently and introduced the evening's portion of the Diocesan Vision Priority, "Vocation" by reminding us of the vision statement:

As we follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad, we pray that the two million people in our diocese encounter a church that is confident in the gospel, knows and loves its communities, and is excited to find God already at work in the world. We pray for a church that reflects the richness and variety of those communities. We pray for a church that partners with others in seeking the common good, working for justice as people of hope.

Frances finds the letter to the Corinthians very encouraging. Changes happen throughout life, and we need to keep involved. Most of our vocations are out in the world. Sometimes church must be "done differently" because the world is always changing and the Diocese can offer training for laity to enhance their vocations. There are specific courses in ministries such as bereavement and pastoral work, but courses can also be run as needed by the Deanery or Parishes. Courses can be held locally or may be distance learning, with a mentor to assist, allowing the participant to take part at their own speed and in their own time. These can also cover other ideas, such as Food Bank work or organisation, as well as Parish work. The Diocese wants to support members of the Laity who are called by reflective and spiritual work, and by using mentors. Courses can be tailored to Parish needs. The Reader Ministry is a specific ministry and the course follows a National Syllabus. Recently the course has changed venue and times and now runs at weekends in Stafford, centrally in the Diocese. Approximately eighteen people in the Diocese have shown an interest in this course. Rev Brian Statham thanked Francis for joining us and inspiring us to work for God in our parishes. He encouraged us to relay this information to our Church Councils. Brian reminded us of the reading from Romans 12 "serve well".

Rev Amanda Pike is moving from the United Benefice of Cheddleton, Horton, Longton and Rushton Spencer to Northampton in the autumn, so there will be an interregnum in the benefice.

The next Synod meeting "Loving our Communities" will be held at St Luke's school, Endon on Tuesday October 1st at 7.30pm and our speaker will be Bishop Geoff, who may celebrate Eucharist with us.

NEWS FROM ST CHAD'S

TOWER ALTERATIONS:



You may have spotted the notice on the church door concerning our proposal to add a new floor in the tower. The architect's drawing is displayed at the back of church showing how it would look.

The new ceiling will be approximately 3.65m (12ft) above the ground, roughly level with the top of the window arch. Access will be via a drop-down loft ladder. In the new "clock room" thus created there will be a fixed access to the bell chamber and thence the roof.

This work will enable safer access to all areas of the tower, avoiding the use of extended ladders, so making it easier to inspect, clean and maintain. The other main benefit will be to make it easier to keep the entrance to church warmer. New lighting will be installed, together with emergency lighting and a smoke alarm.

In order to install the ceiling, the two wooden boards showing the Decalogue, Lord's Prayer and Creed will be relocated into the newly created clock room.

We are now in the 30 day consultation period, which gives members of the public the opportunity to send any comments or objections to Lichfield for the Diocesan Advisory Committee's consideration (details are on the notice).

Hopefully, at the end of this time, Lichfield will be able to grant the Faculty approving the work. The initial estimate from the architect is around £20,000, which we would be able to meet from existing funds.

We will keep you informed of progress as things move forward. In the meantime, should you have any questions, please feel free to ask Kathryn, Julia or myself.

October 18th ST LUKE'S DAY

How any times have you visited St Luke's church and wondered whether there is anything in the building which would indicate who our patron saint might be? You may have noticed the stained class section high up in the window immediately to the left as you enter



through the main door. This window is dedicated to St Luke with the words "Sanctus Lucas". However, you may not have noticed the symbol on the top of the warden's staff which is usually held in place by two metal rings on the west end of the central aisle.

St Luke's School has a wall dedicated to St Luke which has various symbols to represent him including a "winged beast" of the Book of Revelation which is thought to refer to him. This wrought iron symbol has been moved recently. (Does anyone know what has happened to it?) Nevertheless the "winged beast" remains part of the school badge. The symbols on the wall (in brick) show that he was a writer who wrote the third gospel and the Book of Acts and that he was also a painter and of course a doctor.



Home Groups

are a way of studying the bible in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere. We can ask the questions that we do not always have time to on a Sunday. Not only do home groups help us on our journey of faith but they also strengthen the relationships within church. At the moment a group meets at James & Ros's
