# Churchwarden's APCM report 2025 ... otherwise and affectionately known as 'THE SIMPSON REPORT'!

As always, I must begin by expressing my heartfelt thanks to all those who unfailingly perform the daily and weekly tasks, often unseen, sometimes unthanked, which keep the good ship St Luke's afloat and heading into the swell. For example, fire extinguishers get tested, brasses polished, kettles are boiled, instant coffee tea and milk supplies maintained, donations get taken to the food bank, the bills get paid, the offertory counted and accounted for, the heating gets put on when required, new orders of service are devised and printed to help keep our worship fresh, the insurance cover is reviewed. All this, and much more, goes on in the background. More visible and audible are the words and music and flowers, and the invaluable support of clergy who thought they had, deservedly, retired, which are the framework of our worship. So thank you all, for all that you do to nourish our common life, the life of the saints who are at Endon.

On Sunday we (the churchwardens) were authorised to announce the appointment of the next Vicar. My night's slumber had been punctuated by visions of how this news might be received, but nothing had prepared me for what actually happened. I lived through three of the longest seconds I have ever lived through, including the time between the birth of our first baby and his first breath. Three seconds of total silence. Was this apathy, apprehension, or astonishment? Some of us remember the Goon Show, and the voice of Bluebottle – waits for audience applause. Not a sausage. Tee-hee. It was just like that.

Well, that's how I felt on Sunday. But things are changing by the hour. Ros has been in touch with Debbie via her parish e-mail, so we can all expect to know more when the Newsletter is published. I've exchanged several e-mails with her, too. She's planning to re-visit the vicarage, which makes things sound that much closer.

The interregnum has lasted for about the same length of time as the Second World War. As one who has lived through both, for me the feeling of looking forward to something unknown, but good, has been similar.

So for the first time in the history of St Luke's we have a lady vicar. Despite what Google says, she doesn't play the trumpet. She does, on occasions, whack a big drum.

Let's all make her welcome, not least by easing the transition between the priesthood of the believers, relying on a lot of help from our friends, to a flock under the leadership of our future Vicar, the Rev. Debbie Lovatt. Let's all do our best to make that relationship work, and work well.

# 'VE DAY' EXHIBITION at the NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM with a contribution from a Stoke-on-Trent bloke...ROY HORLEY!



As part of the VE Day 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary commemorations, the National Memorial Arboretum put out an appeal for letters written by soldiers on or around 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945. My dad was a radio operator. As you may know I have been busy transcribing my parents' wartime letters

for the last 4½ years so I had a few which were written during that time. I contacted the NMA and very soon I had an email from Amy at Radio Stoke asking if I could show her the letters. She borrowed one of them and several

photos which are now part of a VE Day exhibition at the NMA. Many of you at St Luke's will remember my Dad Roy Horley and if you happen to visit the NMA between now and November you may spot his letter which has been framed beside a short background piece on the wall in the round exhibition area just off the main entrance.

When I was there I was pleased to meet a few of the others who had submitted their fathers' letters including the daughter of Tony Wade.

Roy and Evelyn were married at St Luke's in November 1940 on a 48hr leave. After the wedding reception and wedding night at 'The Plough', Roy returned to Prestatyn Holiday Camp where he was stationed and Evelyn went back home to her parents' house in Sneyd Green!

#### ROY HORLEY

Roy Horley was born in Stoke-on-Trent on 12 July 1916. He joined the Army in June 1940 after previously working as a teacher, and married Evelyn Harvey in November of that same year. Trained as a Signalman, Roy was attached to the 19th Light Field Ambulance Unit which took care of the wounded.

The letter here is one of hundreds sent back and forth between Evelyn and Roy during his service. The words within the pages capture Roy's excitement about the looming end of the war, as well as a story of friends captured by German soldiers before being liberated after just a week as prisoners.

#### HERE IS THE LETTER...

4<sup>th</sup> May 1945: The end of the war is announced and Dad can at last tell the story of his truck being captured now censorship has been lifted. Dad lost some of his possessions including letters which probably explains why I found so few of my mother's letters among their wartime correspondence. Len and George were Dad's fellow radio operator and driver in the 'Gin Palace' 717. Amazingly my Dad was on leave when his truck was captured!

My darling Evie

Your letter of 30<sup>th</sup> April announcing the arrival of the photo has cheered me up all day! Now to update you on Len and George, a mystery I have hinted at but because of the censor I have been unable to divulge. It occurred over a fortnight ago. The unit was on the road led by a staff car, then a small vehicle and then 717. In 717 were George Thomas driving, Corporal Harrison of the Medics (who had just sent a message), Len and Ron Houghton who sat blissfully in the back! It was the early hours of the morning. Somewhere in Germany the column moved along the road. At a crossroads the leading vehicle took a wrong turn, past tanks and eventually infantry. On and on and then suddenly...HALT! in guttural German, and a shot...a bullet through the leading truck. George Thomas had a German bagorha (not sure what this is?) pushed in his chest and all were bundled out. These three vehicles and two or three DRs had run into a German pocket. The Germans marched them off to a cafe for interrogation and next morning they were marched miles around the fields to a Naval prison camp. The Germans were very pleased with the truck and its contents. The German infantry whipped out the batteries. The chief worry was, "Were they going to be shot?!" However, they reached this prison camp and all the merchant seamen and sailors (some of whom had been there for 4 or 5 years) crowded to the barbed wire and showered them with cigarettes! Len told me that the spirit of the chaps was marvellous. They were extremely good to them and fed them out of Red Cross parcels. The prison diet was two slices of black bread and dirty soup daily. They were there for about a week when they were released by the Guards Armoured Division! The Germans, after a brisk encounter, withdrew. I was told that our shelling was so good that no shells dropped on the camp. I heard all this when I was at the transit camp. I lost a great deal of kit including letters, shoes, First Aid outfit, your gift if the Wardonia razor etc. I saw Len and George only for a few minutes a few days ago and now they are en route to England safe and well. Corporal Harrison told me that he had received a letter from his wife saying that she had seen pictures of the GAD release of this Naval Camp and wondered if he had seen any of these released prisoners. He had seen quite a few! Whoa! The loudspeaker has just gone through the village saying that the war is over. Gunga Din has just rushed up to ask if we have heard anything on the radio! It is 8.45pm. I have switched on and there is a play about Anthony Trollope!! We don't care about him! My time goes slow. This alarm clock of mine draws out the minutes. My! Clans are gathering. Medics, a guardsman, RASC are all around. Fortunately we are equipped with an excellent German loudspeaker that is very loud and reproduces very efficiently. At last Big Ben! The surrender of German forces in the North-West is announced from 8 o'clock tomorrow. There are loud cheers from all around the truck. We whip out a 200 cigar box (German) and hand them round!

Honestly we have all been on tenterhooks for days. Today I have left things lying around and found it hard to concentrate on anything! And now only Norway remains...gallant Norway! Well, it's a great relief.

I've just heard the War Report and an English voice...NOT Haw-haw...from Radio Hamburg. This is a scribbled letter written in a great hurry! Everybody who was captured (nine in all) are safe. I was very lucky.

Corporal West is on this truck and up till yesterday we had Signalman Hancock as driver but yesterday he scalded himself and was whipped away. We now have another one, Driver Ferris, a very decent chap. Westy goes on leave in a few days and then John H comes on truck as my second operator.








# Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad

## **MAKING MEMORIES**



Recently I walked with a friend to the stepping stones at Dovedale. He suddenly stopped in his tracks and said "I just remember the last time I walked across these steps. It was 65 years ago. I was 11 years old."

A few weeks before, I was talking to a seasoned headteacher whose face lit up when I mentioned the same place. He shared vivid memories of a childhood stay at Dovedale House with while at primary school.

Why do I mention these memories?

Most teachers, administrators, school governors and youth workers appreciate an immense privilege to help develop hope and aspiration among young people. If it works as we plan, young people in our context are happy and they move on with life-long positive memories. Dovedale House was birthed in 1967 with that same vision, that it can be a Christian place where positive life-long memories are created for young people. Everyone remembers the excitement of a first school trip, the coach journey, sharing a room with friends, getting out into amazing countryside, climbing hills, walking by rivers. All these are at Dovedale House.

Hills, rivers and the great outdoors, feature so much in the Gospel accounts of Jesus's ministry. It was there that people became followers of Jesus, and also where people grew in their discipleship journey, where they learned about a vibrant faith being one where reaching out and serving others was pioneered.

We read that Jesus taught the Christian faith while sitting, standing or walking on hills, he was transfigured, arrested and subsequently crucified on a hill. Jesus was himself baptised in a river, and many people followed his example. The majority of recorded miracles took place in the great outdoors. The common feature of all these stories is that God revealed himself, and this created memories that have lasted forever.

Dovedale House provides a fabulous 50-bed setting, where you bring children and youths, to enhance the hard work that you currently do, to give hope and to raise aspirations for a great life. It is a breath-taking place where we can help young people make lifelong positive memories. In order to fulfill our dream and yours to accomplish this, we need your help.

If you have links to any school or youth work, please can you introduce the Dovedale House opportunity in your places of education, and amongst your peers? At present there is even an offer of a bursary to ensure that no one misses out on making positive life-long memories.

The Revd Jeremy Oakley 'retired to the countryside' from work as a vicar in Wolverhampton and with his wife, Julie, soon found himself offering to take on the role of interim warden of Dovedale House.

## PROFUSION IN JUNE

June is a great month for spending time close to nature in your local churchyard or cemetery. The second week of June sees three initiatives; 'Love Your Burial Ground Week' with 'Churches Count on Nature' and 'National Cemeteries Week' all taking place in celebration of these special places and the fantastic volunteers who care for them.

You may be able to attend an event as part of one of these, take a look on the **Caring for Gods Acre** map of events to see what is happening near you but if not, go to a churchyard, chapel yard or cemetery on your own, or with family or friends and see what you can see.

Wildflowers may be present in profusion if there is a meadow area. Look out for oxeye daisy, lady's bedstraw, vetches, cat's ear and hawkbit amongst others. Is there a patch of medium length grass, where shorter-stemmed plants can flower without the mower cutting them off? If so search for bird's eye speedwell, self-heal, red clover, buttercups and medics. Burial grounds can be rich in species as they contain a mosaic of habitats, with large trees, areas of shaded woodland, stonework as well as grassland of varying lengths. The butterflies to be found can be a mix of species usually found in woodland, grassland and scrub. In June you may find a rich array, look out for comma, red admiral, small copper and common blue which favour shorter vegetation such as grasses and nettles for laying their eggs, all plants found in meadows or in the dappled shade of a woodland or large tree canopy. You may catch a glimpse of a yellow brimstone, which lays its eggs on buckthorn, a woodland shrub. June is also a good time to sit quietly and watch birds busily feeding young, darting in and out of nests. Again, burial grounds can be rich in birds which may also use neighbouring gardens. The church itself can host house martins under the eaves, swallows in the porch or lych-gate and perhaps swifts, nesting invisibly in the eaves or in boxes behind tower louvres. A visit in the early evening may be rewarded with the sound of screaming swifts circling around the church building.

Please let us know what you see and hear, be it plant, insect or bird. You can record species using a smart phone and the iNaturalist or iRecord app, by email or by post. The beginning of May has been busier with yesterday's session being pretty manic, with a lot of new clients, and many of them in quite desperate need, not just for food, but for help with their utility costs. I think the rise in bills is beginning to hit home.

We have been grateful for a bit of a lull in numbers, as donations from our usual streams – primarily the supermarkets – are significantly down. I have just had to place an order with Morrisons to top up our stocks costing about £1000! As I have said before, we are in the fortunate position to be able to do this, but it is quite frightening when you look at how little you get for that amount of money. Even the budget options seem to be well in excess of what the top end goods used to cost.

As I have highlighted in previous newsletters, Morrisons have now stopped their pick up bag system for donations to Foodbanks, which has had a very big impact. To try to counteract this, they have set up various systems to enable Foodbanks to order online from them as business customers, which enables us to order larger quantities than if we were a personal customer. They also offer free delivery, and, if we purchase in store, we get a 5% discount with the business 'More' card. Events during April included:

Takeaway meals from Trinity Church on 15<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> April were very gratefully received by our clients. Thank you again to Maureen Wiskin and her band of very expert and willing helpers for providing this service during the school holidays. Also, a huge thank you goes to Maureen for having a supply of emergency food to cover our closure on Good Friday. There was a need and the arrangement worked very well.

Meetings to discuss the continuation of funding for our Financial Inclusion service – our in-house CA Advisor. The current grant funding from Trussell runs out in May 2026 so we need to ensure that we find replacement funding to continue with this vital service for our clients. We have a big meeting with CA next week so I should be able to give more information next month.

Various updates regarding the Trussell Lobby Day are to be held in London on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> June. Unfortunately, Dame Karen Bradley is abroad on parliamentary business that day so is unable to meet with us, but we will hopefully join in with one of the other MP meetings, and then be able to meet Karen locally at some point after Lobby Day.

We had a very beneficial meeting with Rev Mike Fitzsimmons, also attended by Adullam Housing, to discuss the issue of homelessness in Leek. The porch at St Luke's Church has been a regular resting place for rough sleepers and they have received a great deal of support from the church. I'm not sure that we came up with any earth-shattering solutions, but the more information sharing there is the greater the support there will be, albeit not statutory. We also had a good couple of sessions at McDonald's in the week leading up to Easter, both to get donations, but also to increase awareness of who we are, where we are and what we do. Thank you to McDonald's for hosting – and feeding – us! We were fortunate enough to receive £400 in Virgin Incentives Cards, which were donated to Trussell by Barclays. These can be used at various retailers – a number of which are not really relevant to us – but I have converted ours into B&M gift vouchers which will enable us to purchase a wide variety of our core stock at good prices. Our current list of most needed items remains much the same:
