POP GOES THE ATMOSPHERE

I was inspired recently at a national Church of England conference for people working on environmental issues.

Held at the British Antarctic Survey headquarters in Cambridge, we got to hold and listen to 10,000-year-old ice: as it melts, gas escapes (which sounds like popping candy or a fizzy drink) and analysis of the gas not only gives insight into the atmosphere back then, but scientists are able to use their analysis to predict potential changes up until 2050. Probably even further ahead.

Some people think church and climate an odd combination of topics, but the Bible starts with God creating the world and all that makes it up – land, sea and sky; seeds, plants and fruit; birds, fish and animals. Finally, he made humans to take care of it. 'And God saw that it was good.'

We talk about 'five marks of mission,' shared with 80 million Anglicans worldwide, which are the basic things we do to express our faith. The fifth mark is 'To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth' and this has been backed up by various decisions made by General Synod.

The most challenging of those has been the adoption of goals to reach net-zero carbon emissions in our churches, vicarages and schools by 2030. This target is far more ambitious than our Government's, but it is one I would agree is vital to combat the effects of climate change. It is a daunting and potentially expensive challenge when we take it seriously, but there is a scheme to help all churches work their way through the things that can be done – the quick wins (which some churches have even found saved them money) as well as the long haul. That's the Eco Church awards scheme which guides parishes as they master bronze, silver and hopefully gold-level achievements. In Lichfield diocese we currently have about half our churches enrolled in the scheme, with nearly fifty reaching the silver level and we were thrilled to have our first gold award last spring. Even the diocesan office and our cathedral have achieved silver awards. It can lead to lasting improvements for our buildings and our churchyards – some even make life easier such as designating part of a large and old churchyard as an eco-meadow! Reducing the frequency of mowing can enable flowers, bees, butterflies, birds, insects and small mammals all to benefit as well as making our churchyards pleasant places to be.

Of course, we can't measure progress if we don't know where we're starting from. So we're actively encouraging churches to complete the Energy Footprint Tool which takes a straightforward look at the circumstances and usage of energy in our churches. Last year around half of churches completed that challenge, and our goal is to encourage all to complete it this year. It's not just a dull bit of bureaucracy, it can be very enlightening for creative and practical people to help their community – do ask your church leaders about your church.

A highlight of our conference for me was to hear the Church's lead bishop for the environment, Bishop Graham Usher. In his presentation he said something significant that stuck with me (paraphrased). 'We are all living in the Garden of Eden, we've been called to tend it and we have a responsibility to do that.' Would you Adam and Eve it?!

LEARNING TO LOVE MOLES!

Many of us rarely if ever see an actual mole and apart from Moley in The Wind in the Willows, the other famous mole is 'the little gentleman in black velvet' toasted by Jacobites as William of Orange is said to have died following a fall after his horse tripped on a molehill.

We do however see signs of moles, their molehills. Moles breed in spring, between February and June and this is a time when we see new molehills that have been dug by male moles expanding their tunnel

network in search of female mates. They also create spherical nests which they line with dry leaves and grass and the moles will sleep in these nests as well as rearing young there.

Male and female moles spend most of the year alone, living underground and feeling their way around their network of tunnels using their sensitive noses and also their tails. They have poor eyesight and are at risk from predators when above ground but underground they are in their element, using large, spade-like forelimbs to expand the tunnel network as needed. Most of the tunnels are permanent and quite deep and may cover hundreds of metres. Moles are fiercely territorial, familiar with their own tunnels and using them to suit the season. In colder or drier weather they head for their deepest tunnels where their main food, earthworms, will be found. A tunnel network is thought to last for many years, through several generations of moles. Moles feed mainly on earthworms they create a winter 'larder' by storing earthworms in a chamber, keeping them alive but immobilising them with a bite to the head segment. Up to 450 worms have

Moles used to be killed in large numbers by trappers to make moleskin clothes from their pelt, and were thought of as a problem needing controlling. Actually, moles are both friend and foe to the site manager, friends as they eat many pests such as wireworms, slugs and snails and also aerate the soil with their tunnelling, for as they throw up molehills which some see as a problem. There are numerous theories as to how to get rid of moles: burying glass bottles, garlic or elder twigs pushed into the molehill to name a few. Poison and traps are cruel and are not recommended. Actually, getting rid of your resident mole may not be a good idea as it leaves a territory open for another mole to move in. It may be best to learn to live with your mole and to press molehills back into the ground or move the soil to flowerbeds or planters. The bare ground they produce also makes space for wildflower seeds to germinate which may not happen in a tight grass sward. So all in all, moles add to the rich diversity of life found within our churchyards and we need to learn to love them!

NEWSLETTER March 2025

Dear Friends and Supporters

Thank you St Luke's for your March donation of 22kgs. This is the first edition of the newsletter with our new logo, following Trussell's rebranding last year. We are slowly transferring over but will absolutely not be investing large sums of money in replacing items which still have life in them! We are in the process of purchasing some patches showing the new logo to sew over the old logo on uniform items, which will be a test of all of our needlework skills!

We have reached the end of another financial year, so I will be able to show you not only the figures for March 2025 but also the whole 12 month period. Here we go.

First of all, the figures for March 2025 with the corresponding month's figures for 2024 in brackets:

Total vouchers fulfilled = 64 (97)

No. of Adults fed = 88 (134)

No. of Children fed = 37 (57)

Total no. fed = 125 (191)

As you can see, a considerably quieter month this year. Now for the annual figures, 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025, figures for the previous year in brackets:

Total vouchers fulfilled	= 1084	(1207)
No. of Adults fed	= 1500	(1752)
No. of Children fed	= 850	(993)
Total no. fed	= 2350	(2745)

This represents a very significant reduction of 14.4% in Foodbank usage.

I think that this is clear evidence of the benefit of our Financial Inclusion programme, ie our in-house Citizens Advice service, along with the other drop-in sessions which we hold, which directly tackle the underlying reasons why clients are forced to turn to us for help.

Also, I think it reflects the work that we as a Foodbank do, in establishing a relationship of trust with our clients, which then enables them to feel comfortable enough to be honest about their issues, enabling us to signpost them to the most appropriate source of support. It is a time consuming process but I think that the rewards are shown in the figures above.

We do still have clients who need to visit us on a regular basis, with 26 clients having had more than 3 vouchers in the last 6 months – the "limit" set in our electronic referral system – but we are aware of all these individual's circumstances, and work closely with them and their referral agents to try to improve their situations, and establish an agreed way forward with regard to Foodbank usage. The majority of these clients have significant issues with physical illness or substance dependence so the work is not easy, but we need to try to help them. We also need to be aware that all is not always as it seems – from a good and bad perspective! For example, one of our regular clients lives in a farm, which the family own, so they are not weighed down with high rental, but it has just come to light that they have no heating in the farm apart from a coal fire with a back boiler to heat the water. Not surprisingly their last voucher was requested due to the costs they are paying for coal! This client is now booked in with advice services to look into grants which are available for properties with a low energy performance certificate.

If clients are willing to help themselves then we too are willing to help them, but we will say no! The last 3 years have been a huge learning curve for me, in recognising that everyone doesn't always tell the truth, a sad but true fact. I was on a Zoom meeting yesterday with a number of other Foodbank

Managers, one of whom had only been in the job for a few weeks, and I thought, "Yes, I've come a long way!"

With regard to our Citizens Advice project, the funding for this, which is currently provided by Trussell, comes to an end in May 2026, and, understandably, we are very keen to secure alternative funding to ensure that we are able to continue to offer this service to our clients. I will keep you updated with progress.

One other statistic which I have drawn from the annual figures is the amount of donations received, which, sadly, has fallen by 14.4% from 2023/24 to 2024/25. The drop in donations is very noticeable at the moment, not least because of a change in Morrison's policy, whereby they are no longer putting together the pickup donation bags for us. They are instead inviting customers to make cash donations to Food banks, but I'm not entirely sure how this is going to work, and we are certainly missing the bags, not least because we could directly request what was put into them.

Two very lovely visits in March which I need to mention -4^{th} Leek Beavers and the entire class 2 from St Mary's School! Having 10 x 6 and 7 year old Beavers for just over an hour was slightly more manageable than having 23 x 5 and 6 year olds for a whole morning - particularly as I chose to have them in on an operational day!! But both were hugely enjoyable and thank you to all the volunteers who pitched in to make their visits such a success.

Last, but by no means least, we have a vacancy for a Trustee on the Board of the Foodbank. I have attached separately a profile for this role, and would be very happy to discuss the opportunity further should anyone be interested. Our current list of most needed items remains much the same:

LEEK AND DISTRICT FOODBANK – TRUSTEE ROLE PROFILE



Leek & District Foodbank was opened in 2013 and is part of the Trussel network of Foodbanks. Trussell is based on, shaped, and guided by Christian principles. These values have strong roots in the Christian teaching and practice, whilst also being accessible and meaningful for people, whatever their background. We now regard ourselves as not just a Foodbank, but a holistic advice hub, with a number of in-house and drop in advice sessions from partner agencies. This is in recognition of the need to look at the underlying issues driving people to need to access Foodbanks, rather than just distributing food. We operate out of the Gateway Church on West Street in Leek and our operational days are Tuesday and Friday. We employ one member of staff – our Project Manager at 25 hours per week – and have a team of approximately 30 volunteers. We have a board of Trustees, currently numbering 7, but we are able to have a maximum of 8. Trustees serve for a period of 3 years and are able to complete three consecutive periods of service, ie 9 years, before they are required to step down. Trustees are responsible for the overall governance and strategic direction of the charity, working with the Project Manager to develop our aims, objectives, and goals in accordance with our governing document, legal and regulatory guidelines. With the rest of the Board of Trustees, responsibilities will include

- developing the Foodbank's strategy and its implementation, governance, oversight of finances, charity effectiveness and being an active and sympathetic contributor to discussions.
- ensuring appropriate financial plans are in place for future budget allocations.
- helping to promote the organisation to a wider audience of potential funders and beneficiaries.
- ensuring the Foodbank has appropriate procedures to comply with current legislation and good practice, including employment, health and safety, equal opportunities, safeguarding and GDPR compliance/data protection etc.
- giving your time, thought and energy to your role.
- serving as an additional promoter of the Foodbank in the community.

We meet every two months at 9.30 on a Thursday morning, the meetings lasting approximately 2 hours. Occasional extraordinary meetings are called if the need arises. Between meetings the Project Manager will consult the Board of Trustees on a wide range of topics via email. Specific training is also available via Trussell to assist Trustees in their role. Trustees are encouraged to attend Foodbank sessions where possible to familiarise themselves with the running of the organisation.
