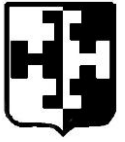

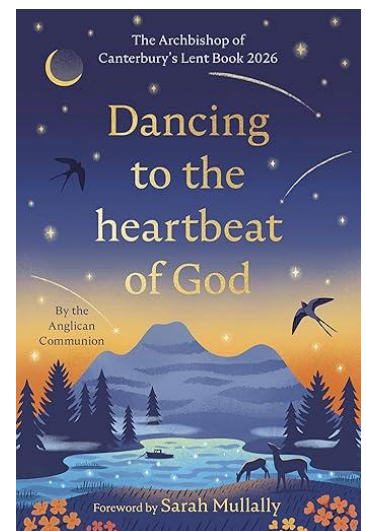
Rev Debbie writes...

CONFIRMATIONS

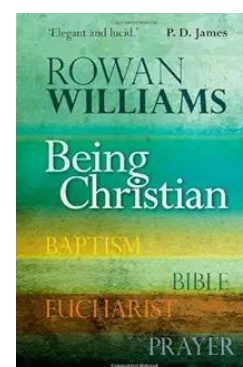

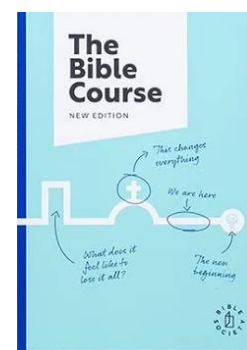


THE BIBLE COURSE

NEWSLETTER

Thank you St Luke’s for your December donation of 43kg. So here we are in 2026, and may I wish you all the best for a happy and healthy New Year. We had a very busy Christmas period but were very gratified to be able to offer such a broad spectrum of support to our clients, thanks to the generosity of all our donors.

Here are the figures for December 2025 usage, with December 2024 figures in brackets:

Total vouchers fulfilled	=	118	(127)
No. of Adults fed	=	166	(185)
No. of Children fed	=	95	(121)
Total no. fed	=	261	(306)

So, as you can see, an improvement on the previous year.

Below, I give the figures for the calendar year of 2025 compared to the year 2024:

Total vouchers fulfilled	=	1029	(1118)
No. of Adults fed	=	1450	(1558)
No. of Children fed	=	802	(878)
Total no. fed	=	2252	(2436)

This shows a decrease in usage of 7.5%, which is very pleasing for us to see, and indicative of both the input from external support services, but also the direct support we provide to our clients.

So, Christmas 2025

- We were delighted to work with Meakins butchers to provide Christmas meat hampers to those of our clients most in need. Our clients were able to choose for themselves which items they would like for their festive treats, and we would like to extend our huge thanks, and those of our clients, to Ian and the staff at Meakins for assisting us with this project.
- We purchased a number of children's gifts for distribution to our client families and were given some beautiful "grown up" gift bags by Trinity Church, whilst also working alongside the Salvation Army to provide further presents for families. Again, thank you so much to everyone involved, notably our financial donors, without whom we would not be able to offer this type of extra support.
- We had so many Christmas non-perishable food items donated to us, our usual one Christmas trolley had to be expanded to two, and they were refilled many times over. Thank you again on behalf of us all for such wonderful generosity.
- We were able to provide a wonderful post-Christmas treat for some of our clients, thanks to Maureen and the team at Trinity Church, cooking up a beautiful chicken casserole on 30th December. One of our clients who was in receipt of a meal for the first time said the following :- "you can see the love and care gone into the making of this, compliments to the chef".
- **The village of Endon came up trumps with Endon High School and St Luke's Primary School donating a massive 827.6kg between them, requiring the services of 5 volunteers and their cars to transport everything back to the Foodbank. The High School pride themselves on beating their previous year's total, so next year may well be the year we have to hire a van**
- Our festive season kicked off on 8th December with a quiz at The Knot Inn, Rushton Spencer, proceeds from which were given to the Foodbank. Twenty of us from the Foodbank went along to pitch our brains against the locals, with one of our teams managing to come 3rd, but irrespective of how many points we scored, a great night was had by all, so thank you to the lovely team at The Knot for this event.
- We also acted as a collection point for shoeboxes for One Project Ukraine. These are shoeboxes filled with gifts for children between the ages of 2 and 14 which are shipped over to Ukraine for Christmas. This year they were able to send over a staggering 1817 shoeboxes, which will have made such a difference to so many young lives. It was incredibly touching to see the love that had gone into choosing the contents for these boxes and we felt privileged to be able to help in a small way.
- Early in December we hosted Staffordshire County Council to film a short video for distribution via their social media channels. The rationale for this as follows – "As part of our December social media campaign, we are looking to share positive Christmas stories. However, we also recognise that the Christmas period can be a challenging time for some people. To address this, we would love to create a post highlighting the support available for those in need, including the invaluable services provided by foodbanks such as yours." A very important message to get across at a particularly difficult time of year. I used the opportunity to emphasise the fact that we are open to everyone, not just those who are on benefits, and also to highlight the additional support that is available to our clients in trying to address their financial issues.

So, a really busy and productive festive period and I would like to extend a huge thank you to our volunteers and Trustees for all their hard work throughout the buildup to Christmas. There were some days when we really had very little idea of what was going on but we just about managed to keep smiling – although I was grumpy elf on a few occasions!

One other thing I would like to mention is the granting of £2000 towards our work from the Leek Building Society Charitable Foundation. I had applied for £1000 to be used specifically for the purchase of butcher's and supermarket vouchers to enable us to help our clients access fresh food, but they were so impressed by our application they doubled the amount! We feel really honoured to be recognised in this way by a much respected local business. Despite receiving hugely generous donations in the run up to Christmas, we know that the early part of the year is often a difficult time financially for people when donations drop quite dramatically. So, I list below those items which we remain grateful to receive if you feel able to give:

DRAW NEAR IN LENT

Helen Emery, the diocese's Whole Life Discipleship Officer is excited about ways of adding meaning to Lent this year.

- Opening the curtains each morning and seeing the light which floods the room as God flooding my day with His light of love.
- Savouring the first sip of coffee I take, thanking God for the joyful flavour and asking to be shown joy in whatever the day has ahead.
- Seeing my shower as a mini – baptism preparing me for the day ahead.
- Using my commute to work or my drive to the supermarket as an opportunity to pray for those I will encounter there.
- Asking God to take away any rubbish which is not helpful in my life as I take the bins out each week.

These are all ways of infusing our everyday habits with deeper, life-giving meaning. It is nothing new – these are all suggestions I have heard over the years from fellow disciples on the faith journey. I am sure you have similar habits which can turn into tiny yet significant rituals.

The challenges for me – as a disciple and in my role as Whole life Discipleship officer for Lichfield Diocese – is to take the big picture of what I believe about the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, the mind-blowing, eternal significance of it, the heart-swelling enormity of it – and ensure it makes a difference to the tiny detail of my every day, ordinary, here and now life. However you do that – whether it be through actions and re-actions, prayers and practicalities – I believe it is the essence of lent. Self-examination, repentance and sacrifice.

For Lent 2026, resources published from Church House will be under the banner of “Draw Near: Life-giving habits for Lent”. So this theme of building our ‘rhythms of life’ – habits and patterns which help us grow as disciples of Christ day by day – is particularly current.

The booklet and app will focus on 6 aspects - worshipping together, praying, exploring the Bible, sharing communion, offering service and sharing the good news with others.

So I invite you this lent to join me in striving to bring our discipleship that little bit more into the ‘whole of life’ - and seeing the transformation it can bring to our relationship with God, ourselves and each other.

Spring Messenger

As winter starts to draw to a close and the days are getting noticeably longer we all start to search for signs of spring. One of the first spring flowers is the Lesser Celandine. This little plant, often viewed as a garden weed, lights up our churchyards with bright, shiny, yellow stars set off beautifully by the surrounding dark green heart-shaped leaves. An old name for Lesser Celandine was 'Spring Messenger' and, like the Snowdrop, it can lift the spirits with the message that spring is coming.

Another old name is Pilewort, suggesting that this plant was used to treat haemorrhoids. Richard Maybey in his *Flora Britannica* considers this prescription to have been due to the Doctrine of Signatures, a belief that similar shaped plants could cure specific ills. In the case of Lesser Celandine it is the knobbly tubers that were thought to resemble piles!

Lesser Celandine is a common plant which can spread fast and likes shady damp areas, but it is not fussy and can be found in grassland, at the base of walls or monuments, on banks, verges and along path edges and is always to be found within churchyards, chapel yards and cemeteries. The cheerful yellow flowers can carpet the ground offering an important early nectar supply to emerging insects such as queen bumblebees, beetles and other pollinators.

Although small, the Lesser Celandine has attracted the attention of the famous. Wordsworth wrote three poems about it and the naturalist Gilbert White of Selborne in Hampshire recorded when he saw his first Lesser Celandine each year, the average date being the 21st February. This date has been known as Celandine Day since 1795. Now, due to climate change, the flowers can be seen earlier in the year with some coming into bloom in late January.

Enjoy the Lesser Celandine in February, its flowers and leaves both die back in late spring so please make a record of it using iNaturalist, as anyone looking at plants later in the year may not find any remaining traces of it so it can easily go unrecorded. Although a common plant it is an important one and one on which our early pollinators rely.

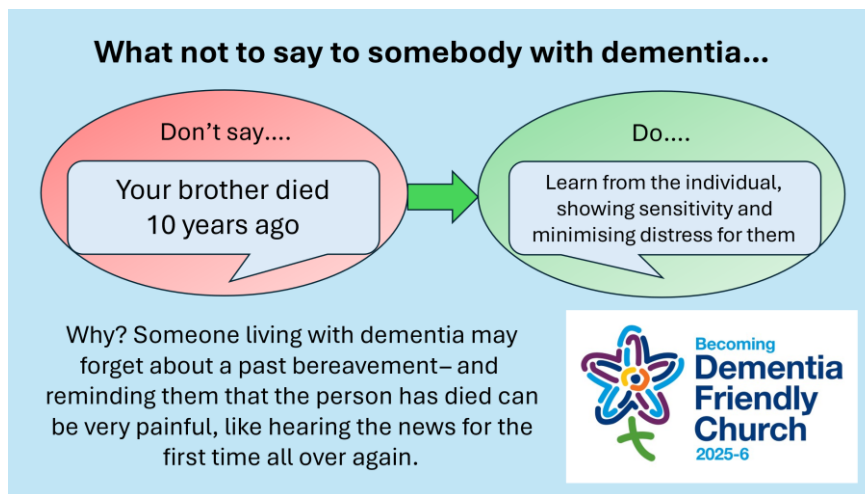

What not to say to somebody with dementia

This is the third in a series of articles where we are sharing some words and questions to try to avoid when talking to a person with dementia.

The Alzheimer's Society blog explains...

"Consider whether to remind the person of a death: 'Your brother died 10 years ago'

A person living with dementia may forget about a past [bereavement](#) or ask for somebody who has died. Reminding them of a loved one's death can be very painful, and they may react as though hearing the news for the first time all over again.

How to respond to these types of difficult questions will vary for different people in different circumstances, however, it's always important to show sensitivity and minimise any distress.

Try this instead:

For some people, encouraging them to talk about the person they are asking about can be comforting. Distraction techniques can be useful, although try not to avoid the question if they keep asking, as this can cause the person to feel more anxious.

Find out how the person is feeling, sometimes asking about a particular family member or friend is due to the person having an unmet need, such as wanting comfort or reassurance."
